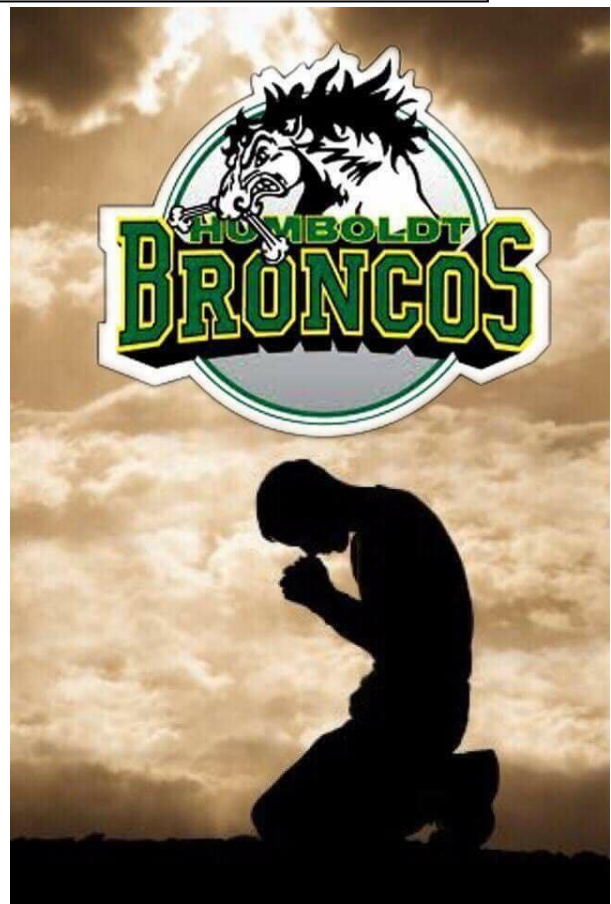

Visible Faith



“Maybe God exists, but I don’t believe in much else.” A young lady recently confided her indifference. We often hear statements like this from our colleagues as our society becomes more indifferent to any religious dimension.

And even if we are believers, we often find it difficult to recognize God’s actions in our lives, to understand God’s pathways, as we carry heavy crosses on our shoulders and in our hearts.

In this context, we can relate to St. Thomas, the apostle who was absent on Easter evening. Unlike the other apostles, he refused to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead. He was a realist and mistrusted their claims. He wanted to see Christ with his own eyes.

Eight days later, Jesus appeared again to his apostles and this time, Thomas was with them. Jesus approached his incredulous disciple and spoke to him. Immediately Thomas believed. He threw himself at Christ’s feet and uttered this remarkable profession of faith: *My Lord and my God*. He even forgot to put his hand in Christ’s side.

Like Thomas, we have our doubts. We also want to be “hands-on” when it concerns our beliefs. But we are in a special time of faith. As believers, we welcome the Word of God that comes to us from his witnesses, through the voice of his Church.

Christians do not view faith as an abstract notion or an intellectual theory. It is first and foremost a total commitment of our entire being, heart and spirit, to the person of Jesus Christ, who died and rose from the dead for our salvation.

This attachment to Christ, who brings peace and joy, is facilitated through the Church. In addition, the strength of witnessing and guidance of the Holy Spirit in our lives promotes our encounter with the living God. The Christian community, the Word of God and the sacraments are privileged signs that foster the growth of faith.

St John the Evangelist records one beatitude: *Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe*.

Blessed are we if we have faith: it is our pathway to our Lord and God.
