# Life over Death



We read the conclusion of St. Mark's Gospel: ... *and (he) told them to give her something to eat.* Christ would not have Jairus' daughter go hungry. Christ had just brought her back to life and she began to walk about. With these words, Christ brings us to a simple and normal dimension of life: you have to eat to live. Our mission is to live and not die.

We do not even know their names. The younger one was only twelve years old and at the age when she would mature into a woman. It did not appear that this would happen. She was near death and had very little time left when her father, a man named Jairus and a leader in the Synagogue, went to Jesus.

The older woman had been hemorrhaging for twelve years and her disease prevented her from entering the Temple and taking her place in society. Who was she? She knew that in her culture a woman who could not have children was not considered whole. Moreover, her illness made her unclean. Jesus was dealing with two women: a little girl who was dying and another already dead, killed by prejudices.

These two women present us with seemingly different and tragic situations. Yet both their experiences confront death. This is why St. Mark intimately unites the two stories. The events provoke the same reaction from Jesus and are inspired by the Book of Wisdom. *God did not make death, and he does not delight in the death of the living. For he created all things so that they might exist.* (Wisdom 1:13-14)

Biological death and exclusion are integral issues of our human condition that Jesus encountered that morning. He was confronted by the reality of a girl who was dying at the age of twelve and of a woman, who for twelve years, had suffered from chronic hemorrhaging. Twelve years of age is very young. Twelve years of suffering is very long.

Jesus confronts death without hesitation. He presents himself as the One whose words and actions bring life. Jesus is an icon, an image that reveals the face of God.

That day Jesus revealed God's tenderness and goodness. These narratives open our minds to contemplate God's involvement in people's lives. Christ proclaims explicitly that we are to live and not die.
